Formerly incarcerated individuals/returning citizens have significant and complex challenges upon integrating back into society. As health care professionals, social workers, educators and advocates for justice, this 3-hour workshop will describe the systemic challenges as it relates to the social determinants of health, followed by the role that HIV/HCV and substance use disorder play in their lives and closing with how to foster retention and linkage to care via best practices.

This workshop is best suited for those who will work and who are currently working with this population and would like sharpen their skills in this field.

This will be an interactive workshop complete with case studies, polls, etc. and a reentry toolkit for later use.

MODULE I

The Role of Social Determinants of Health in Reentry Populations

- Define and identify the social determinants of health
- Identify demographics of those incarcerated
- Discuss the role of the social determinants of health in mass incarceration (recidivism)
- Identify the impact of incarceration on health outcomes

- Discuss the role of substance misuse and mental health
- Discuss best practices to improve health outcomes for returning citizens
