Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) is an evidence- based practice used to identify, reduce, and prevent problematic use, abuse, and dependence on alcohol, nicotine and illicit drugs.

The **SBIRT with Adolescents** training teaches providers how to screen for substance use, reinforce healthy lifestyle choices, utilize the steps of the brief intervention, and facilitate referrals to appropriate treatment. SBIRT is brief, widely used in a variety of settings/roles, and benefits individuals at all levels of substance use (including abstinence).

Participants are [strongly encouraged](#) to leave their video cameras on; attendees must remain interactive through verbal or typed participation throughout the training. Eligible attendees will receive up to four (4) Category I/A continuing education credits.
